Dear Parents, Students and Friends of John XXIII College

It seems to me extraordinary that twice in the last week we have had to invoke our emergency response plan to ensure the safety of our students and staff. This document is renewed and updated on a regular basis but I think we all hope and pray that we are never in a position to use the emergency procedures. We have certainly now tested them in two very unique situations and I commend to you the efforts of all those involved in two different occasions.

Firstly, last Thursday while the College Leadership Team were away at a conference, there was a calm measured response to the Police searching our area for an escaped prisoner. I congratulate Paddy McCarthy, Daniel Moylan, Bernadette Canny and Jim Pearson for their positive actions and leadership; and to the many other staff who exercised such good professional and personal judgement in keeping the students contained and calm.

The storm of 2010 will be remembered by Perth residents for many years to come. The Western suburbs took a battering and I am conscious that many of our families have sustained significant damage to their homes, gardens, businesses and cars. Here at the College we suffered extensive damage to our electrical systems that knocked out our computing, lighting, phones and internet services. Water damage also occurred in classrooms, the library, offices and the pavilion. During the storm we had students travelling on buses to after-school sporting venues well away from the College. It was indeed a perilous journey home and I offer my heartfelt thanks to the staff driving those buses for bringing our students safely home (one of our buses suffered a cracked windscreen, making the trip even more challenging). It is a miracle that no one was hurt. Damage to gardens, buildings and circuit boards can always be repaired; injury to a student or staff member could have transformed this to a tragedy.

Once again the response from staff was fantastic and in particular I commend Des Hardiman, Jim Pearson and the entire Grounds and Maintenance team. Two outstanding contributions to our recovery were Mr Rob Trichilo (the College Electrician) and Mr Kevin Smith (the College Cleaning Contractor) who were onsite until late Monday night and all day

Tuesday. We were deeply grateful also for the many offers of help we received from parents.

Hopefully life is back to normal now and our energy and focus moves to the Fete. I hope the sun shines and that we attract a huge crowd here on Sunday to partake in the array of food, stalls and activities that have been generously prepared by hundreds of volunteers. See you there.

Together, let us seek justice.

Walking away from inflicting pain to being a healer, desisting from lies and speaking the truth, resisting the temptation to judge and embracing empathy as our first response, and always and everywhere, being generous with forgiveness and compassion.

WHY EAT BREAKFAST?

Breakfast refuels the body with vitamins, minerals and energy needed for a busy morning’s activities. When we do not eat breakfast we are more likely to feel restless, unable to concentrate, lack energy, suffer headaches and nausea.

It is important to encourage children to eat breakfast. A good night’s sleep followed by breakfast in the morning helps children stay active and concentrate at school. It also means your child is less likely to get too hungry during the morning.

Don’t forget how important your example is. Let your child see you making time to enjoy breakfast every day.

Here are some healthy breakfast ideas:

- Heart tick cereal and low fat milk
 - Porridge
 - Wholemeal or multigrain bread or toast
 - Fresh fruit salad
 - Fresh or stewed fruit and yoghurt
 - Toast toppings, such as baked beans, eggs and low fat cheese
 - Omelette with tomatoes, mushrooms, and spinach.
 - Boiled egg
 - Fruit smoothie with low fat milk or yoghurt
 - English Muffins with healthy toppings or spreads
- Wrap a banana in wholemeal bread or fruit bread



Former Gangland Detective's Courage to Inspire Community

In May 2004, Simon Illingworth brought about a dramatic culture change in the Victoria Police after appearing on ABC Television's Australian Story. The young detective sergeant, who had been on the force for 17 years, spoke honestly about Melbourne's gangland killings and the corrupt police brotherhood that assisted and harboured them.

In 2005, his autobiography *Filthy Rat* became a bestseller with its brutally honest and action-packed account of the investigation into Australia's biggest underworld killing spree and rampant police corruption.

After four years, Simon left the police force as one of the most highly experienced anti-corruption investigators in Australia. He now runs his own consultancy company Ethical Strength using his experiences and expertise to motivate, challenge and build organisational culture.

Simon's decision to speak out changed the face of the Australian justice system forever. His amazing life of true courage and "on the brink" experiences show how one person can make a difference. Simon, who received a bravery award from the Governor of Victoria, talks about how courage is not limited to white-hot moments on the streets of Melbourne but can be found in everyday life.

Simon Illingworth will be speaking on Integrity in Public Life as part of The Centre for Ethics guest speaker programme at Christ Church Grammar School. 
