



TWO INTERESTING LETTERS

Dear Parents, Students and Friends of John XXIII College

Last Saturday evening the College hosted the Year 12 Dinner Dance. The students looked beautiful and had all become about 20 years older in their presentation between Friday afternoon and Saturday night. On the whole the behaviour was excellent and students participated fully in the night. We received a lovely letter from a member of the public who observed our students in Kings Park before the Ball.

Dear Ms Fry

I'm writing to commend a group of your students that were in Kings Park this evening prior to their school ball. They arrived in a coaster bus and there are one or two things that stood out to me and prompted to me go and ask one of the young men what school he was from, as the group were re-boarding the bus.

Firstly, the girls were dressed in a way that was a real credit to them, their parents and your College. They were simply elegant and wore gowns that were tasteful and not trashy.

As they mingled within their own group they were inclusive of each other. I also noticed one of the young ladies in a beautiful salmon colour gown. It was blowing a gale in Kings Park tonight and she was obviously a little cold, I just loved the way her partner for the evening took off his jacket but didn't just hand it to her, he took the time to help her put it on and made sure she was comfortable, as it appeared she would have struggled to put it on without assistance.

This group of students was one of the first groups to arrive in Kings Park tonight. Shortly after they left, there was an influx of ball goers, and not only from John XXIII. We were left noticing the marked difference in the behaviour of this particular group compared with other groups that came through Kings Park tonight.

I really hope your Year 12's had a fabulous ball and just wanted to take a moment to provide some positive feedback.

The College takes the responsibility of hosting such an event very seriously and we did clearly articulate our expectations that any pre-ball gathering did not involve the serving of alcohol.

It disappoints me to report that not all families respected this request. The cavalier attitude that many parents have to just a 'sip of champagne' before the Ball does undermine the goodwill of the staff who take on the responsibility of supervising.

On a related topic, I bring your attention to a parent seminar being hosted at the College on the 24th February at 7.00pm. Mr Paul Dillon will present a seminar on alcohol and young people. He tells me it is just as relevant to primary parents as secondary, as it is this group of parents who have the most opportunity to influence their children's future behaviour. I received this letter from a parent during the week that I have their permission to share;

Our family first became aware of the work of Paul Dillon following experiencing a parents worst nightmare - the near death of a child. Our 16 year old daughter had asked permission to have a sleepover at a friends house. From this seemingly carefree scenario we were confronted by a phone call late that night saying "that the girls had gone to a party, our daughter had been drinking, was unconscious and the ambulance was on its way". This was our introduction to the risks faced by children in a society so focussed on the presence of alcohol.

The staff in the Accident and Emergency Department reiterated how lucky our child was to be alive as her blood alcohol reading was near fatal (0.33). Our child made the wrong choice to start drinking and lost all capacity to judge what the consequence could be. We are all aware that you can die from a drug overdose but there is little understanding that alcohol is the most prevalent drug our children are exposed to on a regular basis. Our daughter, like many, did not realise one could die from alcohol poisoning.

We attribute some of our blessings that she survived to the fact that Paul Dillon had conducted workshops at the school attended by the party-goers. If only we also had received some of his guidelines on parenting an adolescent, we may have felt more equipped to ask the pertinent questions to ensure our child's safety. We realise that this questioning may cause some embarrassment to our child but, we are also now aware that we cannot presume they are always in a situation that is safe.

We felt strongly as a family that we wanted to share this message as we still live with this ongoing fear of how close our daughter came to such an unnecessary death. The need to communicate with other parents, and ask the hard questions sometimes, is all important. We feel this is what will be offered by the presentation from Paul Dillon.

I hope every family takes the opportunity to be represented at this seminar.

Child Protective Behaviours

During the last week there was media attention regarding a man who was allegedly exposing himself in the Claremont, Swanbourne, and Dalkeith areas. I discussed this situation with the Police on Wednesday and they advised me the man had been arrested. We are relieved this particular man will now get the support and treatment he requires. It is timely however to remind all families to talk to their children about protective behaviours.

- Do not ever go to or speak to an adult the child does not recognise
- Tell a teacher or responsible older student if they feel frightened or threatened by the behaviour of someone while on their way to school
- Tell a parent if they are frightened or uncomfortable about the behaviour of someone while travelling on their way home
- Plan with your child what to do if they miss the bus or if you are delayed picking them up etc.

During the week the College also received reports from parents about a man dressed as a cowboy who was seen at the bus stop in front of the school. I have made enquires about this gentleman who lives in the supported housing on the corner of Mooro Drive and Pine Tree Lane. His carer's are very confident that the gentleman is completely safe in the community and poses no threat to our students. (He does however have an obsession with country and western music!) Thank you for reporting your concerns and please continue to be alert as you observe people around the College precinct.

The safety of our children is our first priority.

Together let us seek justice



Chaplains Column

God summons us to a radical way of living. We are called to be more than just moral. God invites us to be virtuous. We become virtuous by habitually choosing to do good. Friends, in recent times there have been a renewal of interest among philosophers and theologians in virtue ethics. And this presents a challenge to the moral tradition of the Church which for many centuries has been grounded on a legal model of the moral life.

Christian ethics has been concerned primarily with obedience to laws, rules and principles. The expert moralist applied rules to cases to get the right answer. But Jesus criticises the moral paradigm of these legalists in the name of virtue. "If your virtue goes no deeper than that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never get into the kingdom of heaven". Because Jesus is concerned with a life of virtue, he begins his sermon not with the Ten Commandments but with the Beatitudes.

We must start with the proper attitudes which are then expressed in virtuous actions. An attitude is a blend of belief and value, mind and heart. So our anger at someone is often based on a belief that the person has done something to harm us or others, followed by a value judgment suggesting that this person be seen and treated as an enemy. Lust often stems from beliefs, about men and women based on how they look, dress or act, accompanied by a value judgement which reduces a person to an object of gratification. Hence such false beliefs and wrong valuations of others are generally the root causes of sin. Naturally, we are not perfect, but God calls us to reflect on our lives, which can lead us to insight that will help us to be virtuous in the future. Our challenge in this New Year is to avoid the opportunities that do harm and to choose what directs us to God.

John Kavanaugh, a Jesuit moral theologian has this to say about the corrosive impact of our consumerist culture in his book, "Following Christ in a Consumer Society" 'In my own discussions with parents and their children concerning the problem of family stress and fragmentation. I know of no other force so pervasive so strong, and so seductive as the consumer ideology of capitalism and its fascination for endless accumulation, extended working hours, the drumming up of novel need fulfilments, the theologizing of the mall, the touting of economic comparison, the craving for legitimacy through money and possessions and unrelieved competition at every level of life' May a new kind of sensible simplicity cause great delight for us to move toward greater freedom.

Media Statement

A word of thanks and encouragement to teachers in Catholic schools

FROM: Bishop Greg O'Kelly 5J, Chairman, Bishops Commission for Catholic Education

Bishop Greg O'Kelly, Chairman of the Bishops' Commission for Catholic Education, has paid tribute to the work of teachers, particularly those who work in Catholic schools.

"At the beginning of another school year, I would like to acknowledge the valuable work and the dedication of all teachers. In Australian Catholic schools there are around 50,000 teachers. They have an enormous influence on the formation of young people", said Bishop O'Kelly.

Bishop O'Kelly is a former long-serving school principal of St Ignatius College Riverview (Sydney) and St Ignatius College Adelaide. He speaks from a deep personal commitment to the values embodied in Catholic education.

"I am grateful for our teachers' professional commitment to Catholic education and their personal witness to values the Catholic school holds most dear", he said.

"The Catholic Church has always placed a high value on teaching young people. This goes back to Jesus' own ministry where he placed children at the centre of his attention (Mark 10:13-14). And this age-old commitment has resulted in one child in five in Australia attending a Catholic school", he said.

"Teachers have an extraordinary responsibility. A recent Vatican document describes teaching as one of humanity's 'most excellent and creative activities'. The personal relationship between teacher and student is neither simply utilitarian nor even just professional. There is a spiritual dimension to this relationship that aids the human formation of the student far beyond the subject matter at hand", he said.

"My prayer for this school year is that teachers in Catholic schools will rise to the challenge of being outstanding educators. The degree to which the Catholic school achieves its purposes is largely down to them and to the relationships they sustain with their students", he said.

The Class of 2010

The class of 2010 has much to celebrate in way of their performance in the 2010 WACE Examinations.

Much has been made in the past of League Tables and I comment with reservation.

League tables are not all equal and they do not give a full picture of the school. Nevertheless, in 2010 John XXIII College and the Class of 2010 were noted for the following achievements;

All our students were awarded with the Western Australian Certificate of Education or WACE. This is also often referred to as Graduation.

Based on the percentage of students who achieved one score above 75% for a stage three course John XXIII College ranked 21st in the state. Another league table that was published in the press was the percentage of students who achieved at least one score of above 65% for a stage three course. John XXIII College by this measure was ranked as the 12th school in Western Australia. Perhaps a fairer measure of a school's performance is the cohort's Median ATAR. This being the middle score for the cohort. John XXIII College median was 88.2. By way of comparison the State median was 78.2. The median score of 88.2 ranks John XXIII College as the tenth best performing school in the State. It was, incidentally, one of two coeducational schools.

John XXIII College was amongst the best 10 performing schools in six subjects, Chemistry, Drama, Human Biology, Mathematics Specialist, Physics and Visual Arts. This was based on a measure of the percentage of students who achieved scaled scores in excess of 75%.

On a personal note Dominic Knight gained a Certificate of Distinction (Top 0.5% of the subject cohort) for Physical Education Studies and Louis Connell, Emilia Janca, Daniel Song and Freya Hall gained ATARs in excess of 99.

These works constitute a 'reconnaissance', a survey of other places and events. They are observations and fact finding of events beyond the boundaries, hidden from news cameras. The works tease out the meanings of the symbols of state power and offer a critique of the institutions of power across the world stage.



Health Information

HEALTHY FOOD AND DRINK CHOICES

Children's energy needs for a busy day at school require them to eat a variety of foods. Factors that determine the amount children eat include age, sex and physical activity level. Children will have the best chance of getting all the nutrition they need if they are offered a variety of tasty and healthy foods every day which reflect the Dietary Guidelines for Children and Adolescents. Over their schooling life children can consume up to 2500 meals. Therefore it is crucial that these meals are nutritious, whether brought from home or purchased from the school canteen. All meals should reflect healthy food choices.

Suggestions when making lunches at home:

- Choose a variety of foods
- Include bread, wholegrains, rice, pasta or noodles
- Include milk, cheese or yoghurt
- Include some meat, fish, chicken, eggs
- Go for 2 (fruit) and 5 (vegetables)
- Choose water as a drink
- Keep 'junk' food away from school

Some healthy snack ideas are:

- Rice cakes and reduced fat cream cheese
- Fresh fruit pieces and yoghurt dip
- Plain popcorn
- Small tub of yoghurt
- Cheese stick or triangle
- Muffins with fruit
- English muffin and cheese
- Fruit bread
- Scone – plain, fruit or pumpkin
- Pikelets
- Small sandwich
- Crispbreads and spread
- Wholemeal crackers and cheese
- Keep food fresh and safe to eat by packing a frozen drink or an ice brick.
